

Notes by Sylvia Taylor: Park Committee site visit: February 3, 2021.

Following a special zoom meeting of the Augusta Township Park Feasibility Committee, members Wes Mallonen, Dan Wolf and Sylvia Taylor visited the 5-acre open space site, currently under study, to evaluate opportunities following undergrowth clearing of the property.

Dan and Wes concentrated on options to facilitate vehicle access. Attention was given to balancing logistical considerations while avoiding actions that might interfere with yet to be developed site plans. Several options were considered. There was agreement that this phase should be completed before "next-step" plans are developed. Wes returned home while Dan and Sylvia surveyed the wooded area.

Sylvia concentrated on the resulting impact of the recent brushing out of understory woody plants, identification and evaluation of woody native plant species and their importance in future site planning, with attention to landscape value and interpretative use. Dan was also interested in potential trail development

Shrubs of interest: The recent understory clearing removed a dense covering of invasive shrubs, hence improving aesthetics and providing a better visual base for site development. It did, however, risk some unintended damage to desirable species. A clone of the native shrub *Xanthoxylum americanum*, a member of the Citrus family, has interpretive value as the larval host of the Black Swallowtail butterfly. Although most of the clone was cut off during clearing, several sprouts persist at the margins of the cut and can be protected for any desired future clone recovery. Elsewhere, the abundant brushed out invasive shrubs are capable of very fast recovery. They will require annual treatment by mowing, brush hogging and/or chemical treatment. Shrubs along the county drain were not brushed out or inventoried. Their Inventory with management recommendations will be needed as site plans progress.

Trees of interest: The site is dominated by second growth native tree species. Of these, Red Maple, *Acer rubrum*, Silver Maple, *Acer saccharinum*, and Red Cedar *Juniperus virginiana*, are the primary dominants. All are desirable species for park development, many are high quality specimens worth including in future landscape plans. Of these Red Cedar occurs in unusually high numbers, singly and in closed stands. This reflects their early establishment in a once sandy field on Willis Rd. (Sylvia remembers viewing their growth stages as a frequent passer-by throughout the 1970's.)

An impressively large and well formed, Shagbark Hickory, *Carya ovata*, near the NE corner of the wooded area is likely the oldest tree on the property. Together with a nearby tall White Pine, they suggest a local area of somewhat higher ground with fewer flood events and better potential for upland tree establishment. Soil samples will give better information. Other White Pines have been noticed over the years. One was found near the front of the property, seriously suppressed by adjacent Maples. Others may yet be found among tall Juniper stands.

The three of us agreed that this small land area presents many unique variables; well worth the discipline of staged, practical development for achieving a well-planned Township Park.










Ranger Power Activity in Michigan



Several projects in development and the active Assembly Solar project






Assembly Solar Project Shiawassee County, MI









Solar Energy- At a Glance


